The object of the resolutions was to authorize the governor of Pennsylvania to confer with the governors of other States, and urge upon the governments of other States, the enactment of a similar law in relation to the hours of labor. Two objects were to be gained by this. The first to secure the permanency of the law by rendering it general over the country, and thus removing the main objection urged against it.
