The ships of the line are said to carry 2,468 guns; but as about tea of these ships are mere hulks, this weight of metal must be abatedsay by 740 guns. The united batteries of the Russian Baltic ships, of all classes, probably do not exceed 2,200 guns. Of all this force eight ships of the line, one frigate, two brigs, and three paddle wheel steamers, carrying in all 786 guns, have been laid up during the winter at Helsingtors—the remainder are at Cronstadt. It is highly improbable that this division can have ventured to sea with a view to meet the English fleet. If it has really left its anchorage its object more probably is to work its way up the gulf to Cronstadt.
