HEAVY ORE-DOORS.—Metal Alloys &c., of Pittsburgh, are now in manufacturing for government twenty, ten and eight-inch "columns," (cannons) to be taken to the front. These are made of iron, and are the strongest and heaviest and are the heaviest in use in any service. About twelve tons of iron are melted for the pouring of each column. The process of heating and finishing occupies about three weeks for each gun.
