As to floats, I never saw or heard of any such thing being on board; had there been, I think I would have known it, as I was among the last to leave the wreck. In regard to life preservers, I think there were two to each room. They were made of rubber cloth, and were made to be infinited or filled with air, and to wrap around the body, with strings for tying in front. The one which I bad, leaked so badly, it would not remain infinited one minute; while attempting to tie, the strings broke loose, thus rendering it atterly useless. As far as I-could learn, a large majority of them were in the same condition. I considered team of no account. I believe the only persons lost were those who endeavored to land in the wooden boats.
