On Saturday morning, about half past eight o'clock, an unexpected rise of two or three feet came down the Allegheny, v. P.; WM. REA, S. S. BRYAN, W. K. NIMICK, J. M. PENNOC and, taking the lumbermen by surprise, carried off about sixty of these rafts, many of them heavily laden with shin sixty of these rafts, many of them heavily laden with shingles. Most of them were crippled in the start by having their ears unshipped. Some floats were manned, some doubly so, and many fleets of three and four rafts together were without a man to guide them. The Mechanics' street Bridge was the first obstruction offered to their progress, and but four of the fleet passed without receiving mere or less injury. The fragments of the wreck being entirely unmanagable, ran promiscuously upon the piers of the Aquedut, and formed a perfect gorge from the third pier to the Alleglieny shore, where there is now piled up in the great.

Lumbermen say that it is impossible to make any correct estimate of their loss, as the identity of the lumber thus strewn along the beach will be almost impossible. Though hundreds of men were actively engaged in endeavoring to save their lumber, and often in great peril, we are happy to learn that no lives were lost, nor any one seriously injured.
