Flour and Bread vs. Potatoes. A correspondent of the Baltimore Patriot, wh seems to know of what he writes, says: One hundred pounds of good wheat flour con tains 90 pounds of pure nutritive matter, and 10 pounds of water, viz: About 63 pounds of starch, 20 pounds of gluten, 7 pounds of augur, albumon, &c. The nutritive properties of starch go mainly to the formation of muscle, and both combined to the support of the whole human frame. 100 pounds of potatoes contain from 20 the quality of the potatoes, say 224 lbs, upon an average, consisting almost entirely of starch, and 711 pounds water and inert matter. It

requires, therefore, exactly 400 pounds of po-tatoes to supply the same amount of nutriment best potatoes weigh about 64 pounds to the bushel, and a bushel contains 15 2 5 pounds o nutriment. At \$2 per bushel, or 600. a pock, the present retail prices in our markets, the nutri-tive portion of potatoes costs a fraction over 13 cents per pound, which is equivalent to \$23,40 for a barrel of good Howard street Flour.
