They demand reform; and their first blow is struck at the aristocracy. They demand that merit and ability shall be made the test o fitness for effice and public service, and not rank and station as heretofore. And when the great oity of London resolves it must be obeyed.

London contains two and a half million people -a population equal to that of the entire State of Pennsylvania It is more than the entire population of the kingdom of Denmark, or of the republic of Switzerland. It is the most populous city on the globe, and contains seven fold more wealth than any other city. A single London banking house can take a government loan of eighty million dollars at once; and the bankers of London combined can control the money market of the world.
