**THE NEWS.**  
There were 381 deaths in New Orleans during the week ending the 12th of June—of these 200 were from cholera. In New York, on Wednesday, there occurred a striking and unusual case of cholera. It is said to be the largest single mass of cholera ever manufactured in this country.

**State elections will take place on the first Monday of August in Alabama, Arkansas, Iowa, Kentucky, Missouri and Texas; in Tennessee on the first Monday of the same month, and in North Carolina on the second Thursday thereof; in Maine on the second Monday of September, and in Vermont on the first Tuesday of the same month.**

**Grand temperance demonstration in honor of the passage of the Prohibitory Law in Indiana, took place on Wednesday last.** Lafayette Hall was the scene of the meeting. The speakers were: Rev. S. S. Brockway, and address were made by several other speakers. The city was illuminated, and there was a very determined manifestation to execute the law.

**Washington correspondent of the New York Courier and Enquirer says:** The escape of Col. Kinney is confirmed. It is supposed that he took a sailing vessel, and that he will be joined at Georgetown by the same month, and that he will undoubtedly be seized by the Nicaragua government, if he ventures into their territory unguarded. Col. Kinney still retains the 12,000 shares of stock which he received when appointed Governor of that territory, and when the Central American, Land and Mining Company, through default from its service. This company has been re-organized, and will shortly resume active operations.

**The cloud which hangs over the Grand Council of Know Nothings for several days, has at length burst, and the result will be found in another column.** The protest is signed by 130 representatives of twelve States, all of whom adhered to the Committee that reported the minority platform. But where is Pennsylvania? Brother Johnston represented the Keystone State in the Executive Committee, and when majority reported resolutions favoring the "New York Platform," opposing the restoration of the Missouri Compromise, he refused to co-sign. He was, however, the minority reported resolutions, whereupon, after transacting other business in minutes, the meeting adjourned.

**Three Sol Know Nothing Convention.**  
Cleveland, Wednesday, June 13.  
The "Know Nothing" Convention of the Know Nothing party, met in this city today. Every Free State was in full representation. Among the delegates from Ohio were: Messrs. McCallister, Reynolds and H. Thompson, of this city; and Messrs. Voorhis, of Rochester, and Richardson, of Albany. Charles W. Black and ex-Governor Bond were the only delegates from Pennsylvania, Massachusetts. The Convention met at ten o'clock this morning, and was presided over by Dr. W. H. Black, of this city, who was elected Chairman, and Messrs. Bond, of Ohio, and Baker, of Michigan, as Secretaries.

**After the appointment of a Committee on Credentials, the Convention was permanently organized by the election of H. S. Bond, of Rochester, Member of the Assembly, as President, with three other members of the Executive Committee. Resolutions were adopted, and a Committee of nine were appointed to draft resolutions on the subject of the Convention, consisting of the following gentlemen:**

SECESSION OF DELEGATES FROM TWELVE STATES.  
RESOLUTIONS.

**Thursday morning, June 14.**  
A meeting of citizens from various States of the Union, representing the American party, was called by general consent, at the residence of Mr. F. M. Garrison, presented the following paper, which, after being read, was signed by citizens of the several States, as follows:

**TO THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES.**  
The undersigned citizens of the various States, assembled at Philadelphia on this fourteenth day of June, 1860, feel constrained, under the existing state of affairs, to address the following principles:

**First.** The unconditional restoration of that time-honored compromise known as the Missouri Compromise, which was destroyed in utter disregard of the popular will, a wrong of such magnitude as to have no other remedy than a revision of the Constitution.
