It will be observed that no loss of life whatever in Division No. 1, embracing the Ohio, is reported. The sacrifice of human life, there-fore, seems to be mainly confined to the Mississippi river. The only fatal accident of this year on the Ohio was that of the explosion of the steamer Lexington, whereby upwards of thirty persons were sacrificed. It is not contended that the list is complete in number of boats damaged, nor exact in amounts

of losses; while some may be estimated too high, others are too low; but, on the whole, it is not far wrong.
Captain Guthrie says, in conclusion, that there has been no explosion or collapse of flue or any boiler, manufactured since the passage of the law by Congress, of August 30th, 1852, and coming under the reduction of steam pressure.
