If a court or a jury arrogate, through ignorance or presumption, pewers that do not belong to them, they cannot escape under shelter of being merely ridiculous. They at once become dangsrous, learful and terrible.

This delicate responsibility is vested exclusively in the courts, and I repeat that if the jury undertake to deliberate and decide on the constitutionality of the law, they forget their duty and disregard their oaths.
