Every attempt to smelt Iron Ore with anthracite by the use of a heated air blast, is an infringement upon my patent, against which I caution and warn all men; as I shall prosecute every one infringing upon my rights, according to law. And I further offer to dispose of patent rights for the erecting of furnaces, according to my patent, upon very moderate terms.
