The Rev. D. Osgood, of Springfield, Mass. has followed to the tomb 1000 of his people; baptised 970; and anited over 500 couples in marriage.

Not less than 200 buildings of the first class, consisting of warehouses, stores, hotels, and dwelling houses, are now under contract and in progress of completion in Buffalo.

Congress Men.—We learn that Mr. Rencher, of North Carolina, declines a re-election to Congress.

The last Louisville papers inform us, that the Hon. John Calhoun, late member of Congress from Kentucky, has removed to St. Louis with the intention of making that city his permanent residence. He was a faithful representative.

Counterfeit Coin.—A counterfeit \$5. gold coin, dated 1835, was taken at a store in Louisville, a few days since, from a female. The counterfeiter can be detected from the want of sound.

Sudden Death.—The New Berlin, Union County, State of Saturday, 11th, says—"We learn that John St. Clair was found dead on Monday last, at the roadside, between this place and Young's tavern. He was once a member of the Senate of this State, and a son of Gen. St. Clair, who shone so conspicuous in the Revolution, and who was one of Washington's principal advisers in times of danger and difficulty. Aged about 60 years."

At Lexington, Miss. on the 27th ult. Geo. W. Trease, a youth of 18 or 20, was convicted of horse stealing, and sentenced to be branded on the right hand with the letter T, and to receive 39 lashes on the bare back. The sentence was immediately executed.

A Tragedian Turned Preacher.—The Louisville Theatre was lately crowded to excess to witness Charles B. Parsons, celebrated performer of Ovid's tales, when the manager came forward and announced that there could be no performance that evening in consequence of the surprising conversion of Mr. Parsons under Mr. Maffitt's preaching. The audience was very indignant and quite a number of the young people in the front of the house, immediately commenced crying "Uphold him!" "Uphold him!" and Mr. Maffitt stepped forward, immediately Mr. Parsons walked into the broad aisle and pronounced in the most emphatic manner, "Uphold his occupation's gone!" and then proceeded to say that "A change had come over the spirit of his dream;" he had "fretted his brief hour upon the stage" of Thespian and henceforth should "perform" in the House of Prayer and the Temple of Zion; he had left the "sock and boskin" for the sword of righteousness, and that instead of fighting Shakespeare's mantic battles, he should henceforth fight under the Cross of Jesus Christ; and finally, he exhorted his old comrades to remain with him and leave the Theatre to become the abode of bats. The papers say it was Charles's best performance, and that his thrilling eloquence will win him twenty fold laurels in holy orders when compared with the stage.
