To the Stockholders in the Catawissa Bridge Company. THE MANAGERS REPORT. THAT the Company is now clear of debt; and that the Stock will now yield a profit to the holders, unless some unfortunate accident occur.

The Company was organized in the spring of 1831, since which time they have had more or less of difficulties to contend with, and it is particularly mentioned, the construction of a wagon road on the berm bank of Sections 28 and 89 of the North Branch Canal, without which, the bridge would be but a partial benefit to the community. This road was made at an expense exceeding 5000 dollars, which the Company had no funds to meet.

About the time of the organization, there were 836 shares of stock at \$25 per share taken by individuals, and 206 shares of stock owned by the State of Pennsylvania, were transferred to the Company at par value, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the construction of the wagon road, the labour and expenses of which had grown chiefly out of the location and construction of the canal by the state, at a period of time long subsequent to the Act for incorporating the bridge company.

As the stock could not be sold, the company had to borrow money wherewith to defray the cost of the road, and to repair the canal, in its corporate capacity, of 923 shares of its own stock. At a meeting of the board of Managers, held the 20th day of May last, it was resolved to distribute the company's stock, pro rata, among the Individual Stockholders in the amount of 250 shares, and to annul or strike out the remaining 21 shares, so that the company shall cease to be a stockholder. This arrangement was accordingly made, and hence, each individual in whose name stood three shares, will now be entitled to four, and other numbers in proportion, or the about 13 months, the completion of the Reading Rail Road will bring the Borough, within a few hours ride of Philadelphia, and travelling will consequently increase, with these extended facilities.
