Such was the rapidity of the flames, and the dreadful confusion on board the boat going at the time at the top of her speed, that all on board appear to have lost their presence of mind. The Captain (Childs) vainly hoped to arrest the frames: the persons on board fled to the forward part or stern of the boat, all communication fore and all being cut off by the fire raging midships. While the boat was thus still pursuing her course, 2 to Smiles from Eaton's Neck shore, the tiller chains parted and in fifteen minutes the rudder was unmanageable. A few minutes before this disastrous occurrence it is believed, the Captain and engineer, who were both at the wheel, put the boat's head to the shore, but, alas! it was too late, and the stiff southerly breeze drove her up the Sound. At this time, Captain Chester Hillard, of Norwich, Connecticut, who was a passenger, and the only one, besides Captain Manchester, the Pilot, and Chas. Smith, a boat hand and the second mate, who was saved, relates that the utmost dismay occurred, and three of the small bosts were hastily launched astern, and some 20 persons got in each; but the speed of the steamer was so great that the whole immediately swamped, not one escaping. The life boat was also got out, but was unfortunate to relate, crushed under the wheel.

Capt. Hillard endeavored to get over the bales of conten as a last resort for those on board to cling to. He succeeded in getting over some 15 bales, to one of which he had previously lashed himself, together with Cox, a hand on board In this situation, Capt Hillard remained floating with his head out of water, and miraculous to say, cold as the night was, survived through it for fifteen hours, and was picked up the next morning. Tuesday, at 11 A. M. by Capt, Mecker, of the sloop Merchant, which had got under weigh from Southport, Monday night, on seeing the heavens illuminated, but grounded on the bar, and could not get out till morning. Cox died at 8 A. M. on the bale from exhaustion.

Twelve dead bodies have been recovered in all. The number of sufferers is now estimated at 120. The faces of all the bodies discovered, were much scorched by fire. Captain Manchester, the pilot of the Lexington, states in relation to the specie on board, that having but one bucket on the forward deck to bail water with, the passengers burst the heads of the specie kegs in, emptied the money out, and used the kegs in the place of buckets.

The body of a boy about four years of age has not been identified. When discovered, his face was covered with a lady's green veil, the last act probably of a mother's love endeavoring to screen the features of her boy from the advancing flames.


