The Telegraph of Wednesday is of opinion that

the bill will become a law, and the city papers of Thursday, mention a rumor that it is has actually passed on third reading.

The Germans are Coming !- The Bravet Argus tells a story, characteristic of our German popula tion. Several honest Loco Gorman farmers started in company with loads of wheat from Columbia county, for Masillon, in Stark county, to raise money to pay their taxes. The best offer they could get was 43 cents, 3 months' credit. Obliged to ge money, they drove back with their wheat through Columbia county, to the Beaver Falls, where they made sale for cash. They turned homeward in a body, each with his cout turned inside out, and being asked why they did so, replied, "be sure the'll show you of the next election."


