of specie payments by the banks of the Commonwealth, is less owing to the mismanagement of our monied institutions, than the creation of foreign debts by the excessive importation of foreign goods, which ought to be manufactured at home.

Resolved, That as Great Britain protects her Agriculture by corn laws, and her Manufactures by a prohibitory Tariff, and will take no article from Pennsylvania for British goods but our gold and silver-we ought to manufacture our own goods and keep our gold and silver at home.

Resolved, That while the suspension of specie payments operates as a check upon toreign importations, and prevents our gold and silver from being shipped to Europe to pay our foreign debt, it effects the payment of this debt by other means, and we deem it unwise in our Legislature, to force the resumption of specie payments until it can be done with safety to the diversified interests of the Commonwealth.

Resolved. That the people require no premature resumption of specie payments, but one that will be lasting; they desire to relieve and not cripple the Banks, to confine them to the legitimate object of banking, but not to embarrass them with onerous restrictions.

Resulted. That while we, regardless of any denunciations which may be poured fourth from any quarter, fearlessly condemn both the causes and manner of the Governor's veto of the Bill, granting Legislative aid to the Union Canal, we cheerfully express our approbation of the late- message of his excellency, in reference to the resumption of specie payments by the Banks.

Resolved, That it is the duty of the Legislature to follow out the suggestions of the Governor, and not to listen to the declamations of English radicals or the untried theory of small politicians.

Resolved. That flooding our State with foreign smill bills, is in the highest degree objectionable and injurious to our interests, whilst it confèrs a benefit of the neighboring States.

Resolved, That in order to shut out the small bills of other States, and for the convenience of change, we recommend that the Banks be authorized by Legislative enactments to issue bills of One, Two and Three dollars, during the term of suspension of specie payments.

Resolved, As the sense of this meeting, that the present derangement of the currency and the distress in our monetary affairs, is not owing to the suspension of specie payments by the Banks, but to the want of such a Tariff as will protect our own industry, and diminish the importations of foreign goods and merchandize.

Resolved. That in order to restore our deranged currency to its original sound condition, and to preserve it based upon a metalic basis, we deem it the duty of the Legislature of Penusylvania, to pass reeolutions requesting our Representatives and instructing our Senators in Congress, to vote for a Tariff on foreign goods, which will amount to an adequate protection of American Manufactures, and of our Mineral and Agricultural products.

Resolved, That the necessity of issping \$4.500,000 of Treasury Notes to defray the expense of the Government is a conclusive argument in favor of a

Resolved. That we pledge ourselves to sustain American Industry, American Skill, American Credit, and American Principles, by clothing ourselves and our families exclusively in American fabrics, and by using only American Manufactures, made by American Mechanics out of American Wool. American Cotton, American Leather and American Iron.

Resolved. That we deem those regulation of Banks, e best which will prevent loans in large amounts to usurers and brokers, and which secures the accommodation of smaller sums to Merchants, Mechanics and Business Men.

Resolved. That the issuing of Post Notes payable at distant days by the Banks, to foster excessive importations of foreign goods, ought to be prohibi-

Resolved, That the State Banks were chartered not merely for the stockholders and directors, but to assist the Com convealth and sustain her credit, and to a sist our own Merchants and Mechanics, and cherish our Manufactures, and develope our vast mineral resources, their capital ought to be employed in Pennsylvania, instead of being loaned out of the Commonwealth to nourish ingratitude in a rival city, or help the Cotton Grower of the South.

Resolved. That whereas the public domain, cede. by the several States, in trust to the United States Government for the payment of the debt of the Revolutionary War, which debt has been liquidated some years since, and whereas the State of Pennsylvanua, by her system of internal improvement and education, has incurred liabilities to an amount exceeding Thirty Millions of Dollars. Theretore

Resolved, That the proceeds of the sales of public lands ought of right to be distributed among the States, whereby the credit of our Commonwealth would again be restored, and her Cilizens be relieved from the necessity of a direct Tax.

Resolved, That we highly approve of the course of our Senator, Charles Frailey, Esq. in the Senate of Pennsylvania, and pledge ourselves to sust un him in the independent and manly course which he has taken in desence of the vital interests of Schuylkill County.

with the tenth section of the School Law, of Jane. 1836. Districts that have accepted the Common School

System
The amount which each accepting School Disrict is entitled to receive the ensuing year, com nencing on the first Tuesday of June next, out o the annual State appropriation, is a sum equal to ONE DOLLAR for each taxable inhabitant in the

The amount of School Tax required to be levied o entitle a District to its share of the State appropriation, must be a sum equal to at least sixty cents, for each taxable inhabitant in the District. Districts that have not accepted the Common School

Sustem The amount of undrawn balances remaining for the use of non necepting districts, for the School years 1835, 1836, 1836, 1837, and 1839, is FOUR DOLLARS AND FORTY CENTS, for each taxuble inhabitant in a district, according to the enumeration of 1835; and for the shool year 1840 and 1841, it is TWO DOLLARS for each taxable inhabitant, according to the chumeration of 1839.-The school year 1841, will commence on the first Tuesday of June next.

Hence it follows that each non-accepting School District, in which the qualified citizens accept the system, at the next Spring Elections, and lay a tax equal to sixty cents for each taxable inhabitant, will be entitled to receive out of the State appropriations, a sum equal to more than SIX DOLLARS,

for each taxable inhabitant in the district. By a resolution of the Legislature, passed the twenty fourth day of June, 1839, the above undrawn balances are to be retained for the use of none accepting districts only until the first of November, 1840. On which day they are to be repaid into the common school fund.

Henre it follows, that as the law now stands, unless the non accepting districts accept the system at the next Spring Elections, these undrawn balances, amounting now to a sum adequate to the erection of School Houses, and putting the System into complete operation, will be forfeited. 
