Although the Lehigh Canal is acknowledged to be a good work, it is far too costly for the present trade. As well might the few settlers in a new country unite together and borrow money, to make a railroad to transport their few products to a market, saying that the time will come when the increased trade will require it; thus involving themselves in debt for the construction of a work too far in advance of their necessities and abilities, and the interest, compounding on which, would act as an oppressive burthen on their industry.

So with the Lehigh Canal, the annual cost of which, for interest, repairs &c., as shown in No. 1. amounts to \$244.924 59

To which add 6 per cent, interest on \$ 1,000,000 of the capital stock expended in its construction.

Total annual cost of Canal \$ 304,924,59 The descending trade on the Lehigh Canal was 217.146 tons, and the ascending trade 26.041 tons; the total trade passed through the Canal during 1839. was therefore 273 190 tons, and the total charge for tolls was \$ 141,300 11, or equil to 51? cents per ton. (the charge being 11 cents per lun per mile. ) at the same charge, say 513 cents per ton, average it would require an annual tonnage of 589,207 tons, TO PAY the above annual cost of, \$ 304 924 59.

At 3 cents per ton per mile, which is considered a full and fair charge for toll on coal, it would require to pay the above annual cost, 982.010 tons.
