The people are required, if called on to perform military duty beyond the limits of their own States, at the will of the President, there being only eight districts in the Union, and consequently several States in a district.

We have only to call your attention to the universal prediction made in 1833, at the time of the removal of the deposites, and roiterated down to the present time, viz: That when the Federal Executive obtained unlimited control over the public purse, the next step would be to raise a standing army.

Here it is in its full proportion!!!! The next step towards the downfall of this Republic, under the false garb of democracy, we leave you to conjecture. In the mean time you are entreated to pause before you strike this last fatal blow at the liberties of your country.

117. That the President of the United States be authorised to call forth and assemble such numbers of the active force of the militia, at such places within their respective districts, and at such times, not exceeding twice, nor days in the same year, as he may deem necessary; and during such period, including the time when going to and returning from the place of rendezvous, they shall be deemed in the service of the United States, and be subject to suchregulations as the President may think proper to adopt for their instruction, discipline, and improvement in military knowledge."


