FIFTEEN SOLID ACRES OF MEN.

Correspondence of the Biltimore Patriot. Indianapolis, June 1, 1840.

Presuming that some account of the great Con vention of the 29th ult on the Toppecanor Butle Ground, may be interesting to vos, I hasten to give you a faint sketch, such as I have obtained from several intelligent delegates now here on their return

For several days previous to the 29th, every ave nue leading towards the Bittle Ground, was filled with waggons loaded with delegates, horremen, and foot passengers, wending their way to this proud spot of our American arms-and when all were a sembled, such a multitude has never been beheld in the interior of the United States-the number cannot with any proximation to certainty be ascertained-it is variously guessed at from 40 000 to 50 000 men, all agree that there were FIFTEEN ACRES OF MEN; besides, from 3,000 to 6 000 females, and the encampment might, not inappropriately, be compared to Darius vast encampment preparatory to his descent upon Greece; and this vast concourse of citizens spontaneously assembled at a season of the year when the agriculturist has much to do at home. when all classes are ground down, as it were to powder, by an iron administration!

Tus mighty avalanche-we must call it so in despite of the Pennsylvanian-denoted the true Harrison feeling in the West. The Louisville Journal states that a Van Biren man acknowledged that there were at least 30,000 persons assembled, but others estunated them at from 40 to 50,060. The enthusiasm of this immense assemblage was such as may have been anticipated from the gathering of freemen, determined to assert their rights. Truly does the Louisville Journal say " such mighty and sublime gatherings of the people-when were they ever known except during the frenzied days of the Revolution? Do they not denote that the popular mind has been stirred to its very depths by the wickerness of the rulers, and that the people are resolved to redress their grievences."


