

Dreadful news from Florida.

Indian Key destroyed, and the inhabitants butchered by the Savages! Extract of a letter, dated Key West, August, 1840.

DEAR SIR—We were alarmed on the morning of 8th inst. by the arrival here of a great part of the inhabitants of Indian Key. They had left their homes in consequence of the arrival of a small boat, with some negroes from Indian Key, on the morning of the 7th, who reported that a number of Indians had landed on Indian Key, immediately after the moon had gone down; they think from 100 to 150 in number that morning, and had murdered all of its inhabitants, and burnt their houses.

Dr. Perrine wife, and three children, remained in their house for a short time, when the Doctor went to the cupola and spoke to the Indians in Spanish—but it is supposed they then shot him, for he was again seen. His lady with her two daughters and son, retreated to the Turtle Crawl, near the house, watched their opportunity, and while the Indians were plundering, started in a boat for an old hole, flying about two hundred yards from the Key, where they remained until day light, when they were taken away by a boat from Key West.
