"That the inspectors and judges chosen as aforesaid, shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district to which they respectively belong, before nine o'clock of the morning of the second Tuesday of October, in each and every year, and each of said inspectors shall appoint one clerk, who shall be a qualifiest voter of such district.

In case the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for inspector shall not attend on

the said Judges or a majority of them, of the number of votes which have been given for each candilate; which number shall be expressed in words of length, and one of the said Judges shall take charge of said certificate and/on the Monday next, (which will be the second day of said month.) produce the same in a meeting of one of the Judges from each district at the Court floors in the borough of Orwigsburg, when and where the Judges of the meet, shall cast up the several county returns, and execute, under their respective bands and scals; a return for the whole district, and make out triplicate returns, sign.

"No person shall be admitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants furnished by the commissioners, unless First he produces a re-ccipt for the payment, withinitwo years of a state or county assessed agreeably to the constitution, and give satisfactory evidence either on his oath or affirmation, or the oath or affirmation of another, that he has paid such a tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make onto to the payment thereof; or second.
