NEW BRUNSWICE, Dec. 14th, 1840. Mr. Abraham Suydan, the President of the Farmers' & Mechanics' Bank of this city, has been missing since Thursday last and the greatest apprehensions are entertained for his fate, by his family and friends. He is reported as a gentleman who has never heretofore left his family for a few hours of an evening, without apprising them of the cause of his ab: ence, and where he was going. His fate is a mystery, and excites great speculation. An examination into the affairs of the bank and into the private affairs of Mr. Suydam, has shown however, that pecuniary difficulties in either case could not have been the motive for his disappear. ance.

Since the above was in type, we find in the New York Courier and Enquirer of December 15th, 1840, the following, which accounts for the disappearance of Mr. Saydam :

Horrible Murder.

The disappearance of Mr. Suypast, the President of the Farmers and Mechanics Bank of New Brunswick, is at last accounted for and we are sorry to add, that it is now certain he has been most barbar ously murdered. Some suspicious circumstances led to the apprehension of a Hoise Carpenter named Peter Robinson. These circumstances were, that he has recently had in his possession a gold watch, and been unusually flush of money, and a remark he made when purchasing lumber to floor a cellar -that he had paid off a mortgage Mr. Suydam held on his property, but did not darë take it to the Clerk's Office to be cancelled tor fear he should be suspect-ed of being the murderer of 'Mr. Suydam.' On his arrest yesterday, his replies to the ques-tions put to him were confused and incoherent and in consequence the Mayor determined his house should be searched. During the search, one of the officers observed that they ought to take up the floor of the cellar, which had been laid down in the night, since the disappearance of Mr. SLydam. Robinson endeavored to dissuade them from it, saying that if they did, the house would fall down. The officers, however persisted, and there found buried three feet under the earth the corpse of Mr. Suydam, the head bearing evident indications of vio lence, which had caused his death. An inquest was sitting on the body at 7 o'clock last night. The conviction was general in New Brunswickindeed, we hardly see how it could be otherwise-that Robinson was the murderer -- The mortgage deed was found in his possession, with his signature torn off. We need scarcely add, that the highest excitement in consequence prevailed in the quiet town of New Brunswick. IF The wife and Brother of Robinson have also

been arrested and committed to prison. The Murder of Mr. Suydam.

A letter from New Brunswick to the N. Y. Courier. dated 8 o'clock, on Tuesday evening, says,-"Great excitement, caused by the melancholy death of Mr. Suydam, still prevails. That Robinson was the murderer is now placed beyond the shadow of a doubt, by facts elicited to-day. Robinson's brother, James, was examined, and testified that Robinson offered him fifty dollars to set fire to his dwelling-house for the purpose of recovering the insurance, as is supposed, as Robinson obtained his policy of insurance which he had transferred to Mr. S. and which was found in his possession
