

Items of News.

Banking in Ohio.—The legislature of Ohio is about to establish a State Bank, with a capital sufficient for the growing wants of the state.

There are outstanding at the present time \$756,000 of the notes of the old United States Bank most of which are supposed to be destroyed as they have almost entirely ceased to make their appearance for redemption.

The profits of the New Jersey state prison last year were \$10,000.

The resolution instructing Mr. Rives to vote "to expunge the expurgation," which was adopted in the lower house of the Virginia Legislature, was indefinitely postponed in the Senate, the latter body having a majority of Van Buren members.

Domestic Carpeting.—An establishment in Danvers, Mass., turns out annually 70,000 yards of carpeting. It consumes 80,000 lbs. of wool and 50,000 of worsted yarn, and employs about fifty operatives.

A wolf, says Plutarch, happening to put his head in a hut where some shepherds were regaling themselves on a leg of mutton, exclaimed—Ah! what a smor you would have raised had you caught me such a banquet!

Reasonable.—Petitions have been circulated in Ohio, praying for the removal of the seat of government from Washington to Cincinnati.

Good salaries.—The sum received by the United States District Attorney at New York, during the year, is \$28,000, 07, by the Clerk of the court, \$19,468 62. The Marshall of Mississippi received \$7,150. A new law has been reported to make these and all similar offices salary offices, at \$5000 per annum.

A militia Captain, receiving a note from a lady requesting "the pleasure of his company," understood it as a compliment to those under his command, and marched the whole of them to the lady's house. We don't believe this—Boston Post.

Abolition Convention.—The Great Western New York Anti-Slavery Convention held at Le Roy on the 6th inst., numbered about 500. The Le Roy Gazette says that the third party was the principle bone of contention, and that the political abolitionists were outnumbered.

Singular Coincidence.—There is a Washington county in New York, and another of the same name in Pennsylvania. Each of these counties contained in 1830 between 42 and 43,000 inhabitants, and each of them in 1840 between 41 and 42,000 souls.

Thus, though they are both situated in states which are rapidly increasing in population, both exhibit a decrease in the last ten years.

Legislative Economy.—The following from the N. Y. Signal may suit other meridians as well as Ohio: "It is stated that the members of the Ohio Legislature lately spent ten days in debating whether they should publish 5000, or 6000 copies of the Governor's Message, and finally decided in favor of the smaller number—5000—by saving the price asked for the extra thousand copies. The expense of the ten days legislation cost the people of the State the sum of six thousand three hundred dollars."

Ohio has gained more than any other state. We learn from the Missouri Jeffersonian that the population of that state is at 353,761. The increase from 1832 to 1836 was 67,931, and from 1836 to 1840, 119,553.
