NATURAL STEEL ORE -In the town of Duane Franklin Co State of New York, a mine of Natural steel ore has been opened, and worked, from which, without any additional substance the Mesers. Duane who occupy a large blast furnace in that town have, the present season, cast a variety of edge tools; such as axes, hatchets, arzs, plane tions, knives chisels, tailurs and timman's shears, &c. &c. which all prove to he first rate tools, having a fine edge, and when polished, showing a lastre equal to the best cast steel. The ore was smelted in the blast furnace and run into pigs, from which the tools were cast. The oftener the better the steel becomes, as fire does not injure its qualties as it does in manufactured steel. first cast, the metal is remarkable soft, yielding readily to the file or turning chisel, and is capable of being tempered to any required degree of hardness—so as to resist even the file. It has all the properties of the best cast steel, nor can these properties be injured by fire as in other steel; but if the temp er is missed you may repeat the operation as often as necessary without injuring the steel qualities.

Large Casting .- The last Manchester (Engl'd) Guardian says-"On Thursday morning, an immense iron casting, about six yards long by three yards wide, and of a considerable thickness, passed through this town in a wagon with eight wheels, drawn by no less than twenty horses, and excited, as may be readily supposed, a good deal of curiosity. We understand that it was on its way to the Plate Glass Works at Smethwick, near Birmingham, from the establishment of Messrs. Hick and Son, of Bolton, where it had been cast and planned. We believe the weight was about nineteen tons. So great n number of horses in one team, at this period of railway travelling, would, no doubt, appear extraordinary; but, we suppose, the great weight and width of the casting had prevented it being conveyed by that mode."

LIFE BOATS.—The Massachusetts Humane Society, aided by a grant of \$5,000 from the Common-wealth for the purpose, has provided Life Boats twelve in number—to be stationed at the most exposed points within the sea-coast within the State, for the relief of shipwrocked mariners and others. Each boat, suitably furnished and made capable of being transported to any reasonably distance, when necessary, is committed to the charge of ten discreet and able-bodied men, designated by the Selectmen of their respective towns: five or six of their number being competent to the management of a boat. Each company is under the direction of a captain or headman.

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE. - A most heart rending calamity occurred in Wetumka, Alabama, on the 12th inst. The apparel of Mrs. Heard, the lady of Mr. F. Heard, merchant of that place, accidently caught fire, and she was burnt in a most distressing and shocking manner. To use the language of one of the physicians in attendance, she was burned all over, and some parts of her body were burned to a crisp.' There is but little hope of her recovery.
