Supt. Com. Schols. HARRISBURG, Feb. 23, 1841.

The amount of tax every district must levy to entitle itself to its share of State appropriation, is a sum equal to at least sixty cents for every taxable inhabitant in the district, according to the last annual enumeration made in the spring of 1839.

Districts that have already accepted the Common School system, and received their share of appropriation for former years, will on levying the proper amount of tax, be entitled to the amount of tax to receive for the school year 1840, which commences on the 1st of Monday of next June, one dollar for every taxable.

Districts which have not received any part of the appropriation of former years, but which accept the system for the first time, at the annual election in March next, and levy the proper amount of tax, will receive for the school year 1840, according to the annexed list. In these sums, by a resolution passed April 13th 1840, will remain in the State Treasury for the use of non accepting districts, until the first of November, 1841 and no longer.
