The amount of tax every district must levy to entitle itself to its share of State appropriation, is a sum equal to at least sizty cents for every taxable inhabitant in the district, according to the last tri ennial enumeration made in the spring of 1839. A list of taxables in each district is hereto appen-

Districts that have already accepted the Common School system, and received their share of appropriation for former years, will on levying the proper amount of tax, be entitled under existing laws to receive for the school year 1842, which commences on the first Monday of next June, one dollar for ev.
