The latter gentlemen and bankers and had their ce in the rear of the building, with an entrance on Pine st. Adjoining the office was a room acupied by the clerks for a sleeping apartment.
Upon trying the door entering into the office, it

ave way to a very slight pressure, showing that it was not locked. Here the smoke was so dense as to obscure every object and prevent admission to any distance.—An object, however, was dimly to any distance.—An object, however, was dimly described lying at length on the floor, when by a considerable effort it was drawn out—presenting to view the corpse of a young man named Jacob Wester-well known as a clerk: and who upon examination, was found to have received a pistol shot through his head, and several cuts upon different parts of his head, apparently afficted by a bowie knife. One of his little fingers was also cut nearly off, hanging only by the skin-cither by a knife or

pistol.

The fire continued to rage, until it destroyed nearly the whole interior of the building and a very hea-vy stock of merchandize owned by Mesers. Stimonds and Morrison. Some books, the individual proper ty of Mr. Pettus, were destroyed: but a drawer, containing his bills payable and receivable to a very large amount, were rescued: that being the only article of property saved from the Banking Room.
The safe of Messis. Sinfonts and Morrison, 'In the front part of the ware house, was also saved, without as we learn, irreparable damage to any part of

In the Banking Room was a capacious vault con taining a safe, in which was a certain amount of specie. The iron doors of this vault is, at the time of writing, in plain view but has not yet been approached. It however shows no markz of violence.
We have heard no estimate of the value Messrs. Simonds and Morrison's stock. It is understood to have been very great, and not a particle of it was

natched from the flames. The adjoining warehouse, occupied by Messrs Kennet, White and Co. was on fire, and the roof was partially destroyed. Their stock was also seriously damaged by the discharge of water. The loss of property, however, though very great

*is comparatively a trifle. We have noticed the shocking murder of young Weaver! That was not the only loss. The clerk of Simonds and Morrison, named Jesse Baker has disappeared, and his bones are now supposed to lie beneath he ruin: The two young men occupied the sleeping apartment spoken of, and is supposed that Baker was murdered in that apartment. In regard to the time and manner of his death, we are left more to conjecture than in the case of Weaver. The latter was known to have gone to the office about 11 o'clock: and at that hour the dischurge of wo pistols was heard by persons in the neighbor. hood: who from the reprehensible frequency of such reports, where no danger, is suspected, occasioned no alarm. As Weaver was tound at a short distance from the office door, it was supposed that he was assailed and murdered immediately after he

Nor yet is our record of the destruction of life complete! After the fire had been subdued a portion of the wall, fronting on Pine street, fell to the ground, and crushed to death an Engineer of the Union Fire Company, Mr. Ambrose Kimball. Mr. Kimball has left a wife and several young

children in narrow circumstances. Baker and Weaver were quite young men, and are spoken of in very high terms. We personally knew Baker, and always regarded him as a most exemplary and worths young man. Mr. Weaver was a clerk in the employ of Messrs. Von Phul and McGill, and his parents live in the city. Mr. Baker was reared chiefly in this city, but his parents, we

There is, of course, a good deal of speculation as to the purposes and proceedings of the foul incenand assassins, who lrave perpetrated these deeds of horror. From the facility with which the banking room door opened at the time of the alarm, it is supposed that the miscread's must have entitled by prying open that door. Others conjecture that they entered, perhaps, the cellar, during business hours, and secreted themselves till night. One of Weaver's pockets was turned inside out, but his
