"The next case was an interesting one of white swelling, for which the left thigh was to be amputated. The patient was a yeuth about 15; pale, thin, but calm and firm. One professor felt for the femo-ral artery, had the leg held up for a few moments to insure the saving of blood, the compress part of the fourniquet was placed upon the artery, and the leg held by an assistant; the white swelling was frightful; a little wine was given to the lad; he was pale but resolute; his father supported his head and leftband; a second professor took the long, glittering knife, felt for the bine, thrust in the knife carefully but rapidly the boy screamed 'erribly-the tears ran down the father's cheeks-the first cut from the inside was completed and the bloody blade of the knife issued from the quivering wound-the blood gushed by the pint-the sight was sickening-the screams were terrific-the operator calm. Again the knife was thrust in under the bone; the terrific screaming was renewed one or two picked up their hats to leave; scream on scream-and again the bloody blade of the knife issued from the wound, and was laid sside. The flesh quivered and the boy cried agonisedly, "Oh father! father! father! oh mercy! mercy!" The flesh was thrust back with a small piece of wet linen, the divided ends on the quivering muscles were stopped from blood with a sponge—the saw glistened in the hands of the operator -- the father turned pale as death—the boy's eye fastened on the instrument with glazed agon -grate-crush- Hews & Baber, once-twice-and the useless limb from the toes to A B White, the centre of the thigh was quietly dropped into the Sundry Shippers, tub under the table. At this moment the father's eves closed, his child's hand dropped from his grasp, he recled from the table and fell senseless on the

"The arteries were taken up, cold compresses were only applied -- one or two stiches in the flesh -- one or two more screams and the boy was taken into an adjoining room and laid on a bed. The whole took less to perform than the details have occupied From Puttsville to Philadelphia ia writing."

That of his innocence proceeds, I am assured by the same authentic source, from the testimony of two women of bad character, a mother and her daughter, who undertook to prove an alibi."

A. U. S. 74 GUN SHIP OFF ANNAPOLIS.—There is rumor about, doubtless well founded, says the Na-tional Intelligencer, that as some days must clapse béfore Commodore Morris can receive his fin il orders and despatches for his destination to the South, the Secretary of the Navy has ordered the Commodore to bring up his flag ship, the Delaware, in the mear time, and lay off Annapolis.

The plan is to divide the troops into small bodies of infantry accompanied by a few dragoons, which scour the country and scatter, over a large space, giving the Indians no time to rest or prepare their food, and thus tire them into submission.
