

Be it ordained and enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Pottsville, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same: That the grade or regulation of the ascents & descents of & in Mahantango Street shall be & the same is hereby fixed & established as follows: At Center Street seven feet. eight inches above the top of Central Block, thence to rise thirteen feet two, inches to the centre of Second Street, thence to rise fourteen feet ten inches to the cen-tre of Third Street, thence to rise seventeen feet five inches to the centre of Fourth Street, thence to rise twenty feet to the centre of William Street, thence to rise fifteen feet to the centre of Courtland Street, thence rise fifteen feet to the centre of Courland Street, thence to rise eight feet six inches to the centre of St. Johns others, who stepped forward to his assistance after the loss of his property by fire in December last, and would also acquaint them and the public generally, that he has again commenced the Drug Business in the house formerly occupied by Charles W. SEC. 4. The footways or sidewalks aforesaid, shall be made or paved with brick, on the grace or regulation established in the front section of this ordinance, and supported with Carl Suppose Learning that the there foot

and supported with Curb Stones not less than three fee long and six inches thick; the Curb Stones on the South wardly side of the Street to be not less than two fee wine inches wide, and the top to stand sixteen inche above the gutter, and on the Northwardly side to be no less than two feet wide, and the top to stand nine in-ches shove the gutter. The ends of the Curb Stone to be hewed and dressed to an even joint, the top to be dressed to a straight line, and so bevelled that whife the top shall rise one half inch to the foot, the front may learn back one inch to the foot, when the stones ar planted. Provi-DED, that in front of any lots not actually sailt upon, the side walks or footways shall not be required to be paved to a greater width than five feet from the l'urb Stone, the residue of such footway or sidewalk from the said pavement to the line of the Street being laid with gravel so as to support the pavements.
SEC. 5. No person shall set or cause to be set any Curb Stone, or to make or cause to be made any pave ments, side walks, until the grade thereof shall be given by a person appointed by the Council for that purpose, and any person who shall set, or cause to be set

any Curb Stone, or shall make or cause to be made any Pavement or side walks contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, shall for every offence forfeit and pay a renalty of twenty dollars.
