Furiours. - Freights between this place and Philadelphia have undergone considerable fluctuation during the last week. At the commencement of the week, it had fallen to \$1,00; but since then, the price has advanced, and we now quote to Philadel phia at \$1,35. It is generally believed that a still further advance will take place. We quote to New York, \$4,30. On the Schuylkill at Philadelphia, coal vessels continue unusually scarce. Shippers have been compelled to submit to another advance in the price of freight. We quote from Philadelphia to Boston and Salem, \$2,50; Providence, \$2,123 New York, \$2.00.

THE READING RAILROAD .- The despatch used on the Reading Railroad is almost beyond precedent. The stages will commence running to Mohrsville, 10 miles above Reading, on Monday next. Below our borough, workmen are busily engaged in laying the sleepers and rails, a part of the iron having arrived. The report that a portion of the Tunnel at Port Clinton had fell in, is without foundation. We understand that the Tunnel will be completed about the 1st of December.

The engineer of the Reading Railroad states that the road will be finished to Pottsville by the 1st of December. We are inclined to place the period one month later. By that time we believe the Company will be able to transport passengers and merchandize from this place to Philadelphia, but not sooner. The public may rest assured that little or no coal will be transported over this road during the coming winter, unless a great advance should take place in the price of coal at Philadelphia. Under such a circumstance, our colliers might be induced to haul their coal in wagons and carts over the common roads to the depot.

The great importance of this work to this region, and to our borough in particular, must be manifest to all who have bestowed a thought on the subject. All the travelling from the northern counties of this state must concentrate on this point; and during the winter large quantities of merchandize must find its way to Pottsville from Philadelphia, to be sent in wagons from this place to that section of the country. These are great but only the incidental advantages of the road.
