EDURSUANT to an Act of Assembly, passed the 6th day of April, 1840, entitled an act graduating the duties upon wholesale dealers and retarlers of merchandize, and prescribing the mode of issuing licenses and collecting said duties, the constables of the several boroughs and townships in said county having made their several returns (under onth or affirmation, to the clerk of the court of Quarter Sessions of said county,) of the lists of all the wholesale dealers or retailers of goods, wares, and merchandize, wines or distilled liquors, drugs or medicines, [ulcept such as are the growth, produce or manudealers embraced in the provise ns of the said re cited act, are hereby notified that agreeably to the fith section thereof, the associate judges and county commissio era will-meet at the commisoffice, in Orwigsburg, on Thursday, the 31st of March inst., at 10 o'clock in the forenoon when you may appear before the said judges and commissioners, and show the amount of your anmust sales during the past year, and on failure to atlend as aforesaid, the judges and commissioners will class you according to the best information they can have or obtain,

And pursuant to an act of assembly of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, passed the 30th day of April, A. D. 1841, entitled an act to proide revenue to meet the demands on the freasury, and for other purposes, in the tenth section whereof, it is enacted as follows:

Section 10. That from and after the passage of this act, the several provisions now in force of heact of the fourth of March, eighteen hundred and twenty-four, entitled "A supplement to the act entitled an act laying a duty on the retailers of foreign merchandize," and the several provisions of the act of the seventh of April, eighteen hundred and thirty, entitled " An act graduating he duties upon wholesale dealers and retailers of merchandize, and prescribing the mode of issuing licenses and collecting duties," except so thereof as may hereby be altered, or supplied, shall be and the same are nereby extended and applied to all persons engaged in the selling modities or effects, of whatsoever kind or nature, and all such sellors or venders shall be classed and required to pay annually for the use of the nonwealth, for their respective licenses, as follows, viz:

Those who, are esteemed and taken to make and effect annual sales to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars and upwards, shall constitute the first class, and pay two hundred

Those to the amount of two hundred thousand, and less than three hundred thousand, the second class, pay one hundred and fifty doflars. Those to the amount of one hundred thousand and less than two hundred thousand, the third class, and pay one hundred dollars.
Those to the amount of eighty-five thousand

and less than one hundred thousand dollars, the fourth class, and pay eighty dollars. Those to the amount of seventy-five thousand, and less than eighty-five thousand dollars, the fifth class, and pay sixty dollars.

Those to the amount of sixty, and less than seventy five thousand dollars, the sixth class, and pay fifty dollare 2000 ose to the amount of fifty thousand, and less

than sixty thousand dollars, the seventh class, and pay forty dollars. Those to the amount of forty thousand, and

less than fifty thousand dollars, the eighth class, and pay thirty dollars. Those to the amount of thirty thousand, and less then forty thousand dollars, the ninth class,

and pay twenty-five dollars. Those to the amount of twenty thousand, and less than thirty thousand dollars, the tenth class, and pay twenty dollars.

Those to the amount of fifteen thousand and

less than twenty thousand dollars, the eleventh class, and pay fifteen dollars. ose to the amount of ten thousand and less than fifteen thousand dollars, the twelfth class, and pay twelve dollars and fifty cents.

Those to the amount of five thousand, and less

than ten thousand collars, the thirteenth class, Those to the amount of five thousand, the four-

nth class, and pay seven dollars. Provided. That where such wholesale or retail dealers confine their purchases and sales to baving and vending goods, wares and merchanthe growth, product and manufacture of the United States, he or they shall pay only one half the amount of the license required by the provisions of this section.

And every seller or vender of wines or distilled liquors, either with or without other goods, wares, merchandize, commodities, or effects, as aforesaid, shall pay for his license fifty per cent. in addition to the rates above specified for the respective classes, and every license hereafter granted, shall specify whether the party obtaining the same is or as not entitled to sell or vend

wines or distilled liquors.

Provided, That no person whose annual sales do not exceed one thousand dollars, and no feme sole trader, or single woman, whose annual sales do not exceed two thousand five hundred dollars, venders of wines or distilled liquors excepted, nor any importer of foreign goods, wares, or merchandize, who may vend or dispose of the same in the original packages as imported, nor any person who may vend or dispose of articles of his own growth, produce or manufacture, shall be required to take out a license under this act.
