or retailers of goods, wares, and merchandize, wines or distilled liquors, drugs or medicines, [except such as are the growth, produce or manufacture of the United States.] Merchants and dealers embraced in the provisions of the said re-cited act, are hereby notified that agreeably to the fifth section thereof, the associate judges and ounty commissioners will meet at the commis stoners' office, in Orwigsburg, on Thursday, the 31st of March inst., at 10 o'clock in the forenoun when you may appear before the said judges and mmissioners, and show the amount of your annual sales during the past year, and on failure to attend as aforesaid, the judges and commission-ers will class you according to the best informa-

tion they can have or obtain. And pursuant to an act of assembly of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, passed the 30th day of April, A. D. 1841, entitled an act to provide revenue to meet the demands on the treasury, and for other purposes, in the tenth section vhercof, it is enacted as follows:

And every seller or vender of wines or distilled liquors, either with or without other goods, wares, merchandize, commodities, or effects, as aforesaid, shall pay for his license fifty per cent in addition to the rates, above specified respective classes, and every license hereafter granted, shall specify whether the party obtaining the same is or is not entitled to sell or vend wines or distilled liquors.
