The Black Dishond, as well as the Vulcan, ara now in the North River near the Phoenix Foundry, where they were built. and their steam machinery and propellers very

nearly complete. TRIUMES OF STEAM .- The greatest triumph of steam navigation yet accomplished, was acheiv ed by the British and North American royal mail steamer Columbia, which made her last passage from Boston to Liverpool (including a stoppage of meyeral hours at Halifux) in 11 days and 12 hours. The Great Western, too, made a splendid run seross the Atlantic. She effled from New York on the same day that the Columbia left Boston, and notwithstanding a deviation of two hundred miles to the south to avoid the ice. made the passage to Bristol in 12 days and 12 hours.
