which had been sent him immediately after the adjournment of the Legislature, by the engraver. We can only hope that our citizens will refuse to take any notes of a lower denomination than one dollar, for it is the only course which can drive the trash out of the community, and for all the purposes of business, we have change sufficient without them. Let every attempt to introduce this miserable paper be discountenanced by our storekeepers and dealers-if this is done, we sha secure ourselves from the loss which will visit the many who receive them.


