Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Town Council, of the Borough of Pottsville it is hereby ordained and enacted by the author ity of the same, that the grades and regulation of the ascents and descents in Market street, from Centre street, to the upper culvert in Eighth street; Adams street, from Market in High street and North Third street, from Market to High street; be, and the same is hereby fixed and es. tablished as follows:-NORTH SIDE.

ommencing at the Curh Stone recently set at the North West corner of Centre and Market streets, which is one foot one inch above the top t Central Block, from thence rise four feet seven inches to the North East corner of Adams street thence fall three inches and five-tenth to the north west corner of the same, from this point, rise four feet eleven inches, to a point seventy five feet west of Third street, from thence to fall one such and five tenths to the culvert across Market street. From thence rise six feet nine inches and eight tenths to Wolf'A at the northeast corner of Wolcott street, (which is four feat Higher than the present curb stone.) The curb at the northwest corner of Market square and Wolcott street. be one foot lower than at the northeast corner trom thence to rise ten feet three inches and two tenths to the middle of Levy's alley, thence to rise twelve feet five inches and six-tenths to the northeast corner of Courtland street and Market square, from thence to rise nine feet eight inches and six tenths to the northeast corner of Severith or John street, and from thence to rise nine feet nine inches to the middle of Eighth street, at the

upper culvert. SOUTH SIDE, Commencing at the Southwest corner of Marke and Centre streets, make the curb there, level with that at the northwest corner; then rise three feet ten inches to the southeast corner of Adams street, from thence rise four inches to the south est corner, and from thence to the culvert near Nichola's, the rise to be five feet six inches and six tenths, thence rise six feet one inch and sev-ep-tenths to the southeast corper of Fourth or Cumming street, then rise twelve feet and tenths of an inch to the southwest corner of Wil liam street, (which is the height of the present curb) from thence rise thirteen feet two inches to the poutheast corner of Courtland street, from thence rise seven feet seven inches and tour-tenth to the southeast corner of John street, and from hence to the middle of Eighth street, the rise to be nine feet nine inches.

Section 2. Grade of North Adams street.

EAST SIDE. Commencing in the grade line of Market street, which is there five feet eight inches above cen tral Block from thence rise two feet four inches and two tert'rs, to the middle of callowhill street, then rise six feet ten inches and seven tenths to the middle of High street. WEST SIDE.

Commencing in the grade line of Market street, which is there, four inches and four-tenths lower than the commencement of the east side, from thence rise three feet two inches and seven-tenths to the middle of Callowhill street, and from thence rise six feet four inches and seven tenths, to the conthwest corner of High street. wards the said line of the street Provided, That in front of any lots not actually built upon, the side-walks or foot-ways shall not be required to be paved to a greater width than five feet from the curb-stone, the residence of such foot-ways or side walks, from the said pavements to the line of the street, being laidwith gravel, so as to support the pavements. any pavements or side walks, until the grade and blace thereof, shall be given by the Borough Surveyor, or a person appointed by the Council for that purpose.
