THE TARIFF. THE DEMOCRACY AND THE TARIFF.-The expositions made by Mr. VAN BUREN touch ing his opinions on the Tariff, do not appear to be satisfactory to the southern portion of the democincy, or to that portion which adheres to Mr. CALHOUN. The understanding being now established that the convention of that party for the Presidential nomination will be held in May next, we may expect that the approaching session of Congress will witness a re-agitation of the whole Tariff subject in view of the electioneering canwass which is to follow next year. This is much to be deprecated, but if the people will have it so, they must bear the consequences. Nothing but the continued ascendancy of the Whige in Congress can secure permanence to the Tariff policy.

It is evident enough that one section of the party calling itself domocratic is determined to have no middle ground on this subject. We shall presently adduce some proof of this although the thing is neither secret nor new. VAN BOREN'S double dealing and equivocal language will not go down in that quarter. The Charleston Mercury illustrates the vague and shifting lines with which that gentleman has attempted to define his position by the following enalogy : . If a man will go out , and try to measure the shadow, of a tree top, in . windy day, he will find two difficulties-first, to fix the exact place where the tree begins and second, to fix the exact place it ends. We have experienced a little of this in assigning the boundaries to Mr. Van Bueren's principles of tariff my abilities. texation-they all seem to be in motion."

It appears that nothing will satisfy those who claim to be the true democracy but uncompromising hostility to the principle of protection. But it is not yet made clear how they would medify the Tariff so as to secure sufficient revenue from the customs, and at the same time accomplish their purpose of destroying the protective principle. There is a great deal of vague talking on the subthey agree, and in what they differ. Here is the language of the Mercury, which we quote as in dicative of the views of Mr. Caluoun's party : Opposition to a Tariff for protection, says that journal, is one of the cardinal dectrines of the Republican party; and no man is justly obnexious to the charge of being 'a disorganizer' who insists uncompromisingly upon its being strictly and certainly enforced. Our friends should quarrel with no one for insisting upon any of the cardinal principies of the party."

This does not specify what rate of duties would constitute a Tariff for protection, nor is any such specification to be found of the exact line that separates the Tariff. If an unverrying standard To the Free and Independent Voters is fixed, say twenty per cent some interests would find protection in that. But if that rate of duties did not yield revenue enough— that rate of duties did not yield revenue enough— what then? It might be necessary to make distinguishing. Should those discriminations be made in favor of domestic interests or adverse to fice of .. them ? . If no discriminations are made, if a higher them? If no discriminations are made, if a nigner horizontal scale should be fixed, then protection at the next October Election. Should I be so fortunate as to receive a majority of your votes, would be extended still further to some pursuits, while others would suffer. There are importstions of raw meterial used in various kinds of manufacture; an unvarying rate of duties might so enhance the prices of these as to forbid the manufactures for which they were used. But it is useless to continue this view of the subject. The opponents of protection must define clearly what they mean.

Some of them have done so. Some have gone directly and at once to the position towards which otheir principle tends; they have advocated the abolition of all dutier, and have proposed that the revenue necessary for the Government should be raised by direct taxation. We will do them the justice to say that they are consistent, open and intelligible. The New Orleans Courier holds this language :

"No where that we are aware of, does the Democracy support or sustain a Protective Tariff. Take, their leading journals throuhout the country -the Washington Globe and the New York Exening Post-the Richmond Enquirer and the Charleston Mercury, and they all hold one and the same tanguage upon the question of its impolicy. They are all Anti-Toriff. And as for all our pubhe men-whether Van Burn or Calhoun, Woodbury or Cass, Johnson or Buchanan-be they from the North. East; West or South, they agree explicity upon the principle of resistance to a Protective Tariff, and when, if the day should ever arrive, that enlightened public opinion should justify no impost duties, but direct taxation, the Democratic party will not be behind public opinion: for the principle of Democracy is an advancing principle, and nut a stationary or a retrogading

It is inevitable that so long as revenue is derived from custom-house duties, so long will the princple of protection be involved in the laying of imposts. No line can be drawn separating in a sais factory manner the question of revenue from that of protection. The advocates of free trade, as that term is used, must go to the full extent of an entire abrogation of duties on importation. For the duties which are laid for revenue are as incompatible with the freedom of trade, which they conted for, as though such duties were laid for protection. France taxes our tobacco eight hundred per cont-and all for revenue. We have no protective duties so high as the rate to which our

duties might be carried for revenue. The truth is that all this wrangling about protective daties and revenue duties arises out of a conflict, roal or supposed, of different interests When the Calhoun organs denounce protection tomanufactures. They hope that the cotton growers might sell more cotton to England if England had the privilege of supplying the United States with manufactured goods, and they also entertain the idea that they would be enabled to procure such articles as they need on cheaper ternis from British manufacturers than from our own. They do not object to having their own interests protected by thus shaping the policy of the government for their especial advantage; this is what they claim, and they call it contending for prin-

Potteville, May 14, interest more than of any other great domestic interest, but advocate a discriminating Tariff to the end that all interests may be promoted. The farmer is as much concerned in such a Tariff as any other man; the planter, whether of cotton or adependence in the present ctate of the world.

There is no design in any quarter that we know of to oppose the cotton growing interest; it should have its due consideration, but it should not be the only interest to be considered. The whole question at last is one of adjustment, arrangement, and mutual compromise-unless the free impor tationmen declare against all duties and go fo direct taxation. That is the only ground that can be fairly occupied by the opponents of protection if they would really make the contreversy one of principle .- Balt. American.
