To Make Ice CREAM .- A Lady correspon dent of the "American Agriculturist," a j u nal which we never take up without finding some thing to amuse and instruct, gives the following as a recipe for making good Ice Cream. Coming from the source it does, we can confidently recommend a trial of it by those of our readers who wish to regale upon this delicious summer refreshment :

"To two quarts of milk add three heaten eggs. stir them tog-ther, and place over a fire till brought by sairring and a gentle heat to the consistence of cream. When warm, add a table-spoonful of diluted arrow-root or starch; then sweeten and flivor to your taste with femon, peach-leaves, or vanida, and set by to coul. When cold, pour the cream into a small pail, which insert in a larger one, well covered on the bottom with ice, and springled with salt. Put ice in the space between the pails, and add sait to it as before. As the mixture freezes, stir it occasionally, till all is equally frezen. The above is improved by using half cream. If you theyor with peach leaves or cinnamon, put them over to warm (not boil Y with the milk, and then strain before adding the sugar .-The ice must be put into the form after it is thor A LADY."
