walks and gutters in parts of Centre and Railroad Streets. Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Fown Council of the Borough of Pottsville, and it

s hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, that the grades or regulations of the ascents of Centre Street, from Central Blook north-wardly to the northeast corner of Laurel etreet. and southwardly to the south line of Morris's Addittor, be, and the same is, hereby fixed and es tablished as follows, viz:-NORTH CENTRE STREET, EAST SIDE. At the northeast corner of Centre and Norwe

who streets the curb line shall commence two and a half inches below the top of Central Block, from thence tall one foot five inches to a culvert, distant one hundred and two feet, from thence shall rise one foot seven and a half mehes to the outheast corner of Market stree!, thence level to the northeast corner of said street, thence shall rise nine inches to a summit eighty feet distant thence fall one fort three inches to the southeas corner of Callowhill street, thence rise two inche to the northeast corner of said street, thence ris eight feet one inch and five tenths to the south east corner of High street, thence rise five inche and five tenths to the northeast corner of said street, and from thence rise twelve teet five inches to the northeast corner of Laurel street. NORTH CENTRE STREET. WEST SIDE

From the southwest corner of High street, the curbstone shall extend in straight line to a point at the southeast corner of Laurel Alley, eleven feet from the west side of Centre street, and thence continue at the distance of eleven feet therefrom, to the southeast corner

of Laurel street.

From the southeast corner of High street, th curb stone shall extend to a point thirteen feet from the east side of Centre street, and distant one hungred and seven feet from Northern Block from thence extend thirty-three feet to a point leven feet from the east side of the street, and from thence continue at the distance of eleven lest from the east side of the street, to the south

east corner of Laurel street. PART OF RAILROAD STREET.

feet seven mehes below the top of Central Block the curb line shall rise six inches to the southwest corner of Cellowhill street. There shall be but one line of curbstone and one pavement or side walk in this street, which chall be on the west side thereof, and eix feet wide, measuring from the true line of the street. Section 4. The side-walks or foot-wave on both sides of Centre street, from the south line of Morris's Addition to the south side of Laurel street, and on the west side of Rullroad street between Market and Callowhill streets, shall be graded, cut down, or filled up, according to the several ascents and descents herein above set forth, and curbed and payed, and the gutters made and paved as herein after directed, and the property in front of which such footways or sidewalks and gutters shall be made and paved, shall be and the same is hereby taxed with the expense thereof, in proportion to the extent of the same in front on said streets, agreeably to the provisions of the Act of Assembly entitled, "A supplement to an act entitled an act incorporating the town

Pottsville in Schoylkill County into a Borough," passed the 15th day of June, A. D. 1840. Section 5. The curb stones to be placed in said treets, shall be at least three feet long, two feet wide, and six inches thick, and whetever it may be necessary to extend the curbstones more tha ten inches above the gutter, that for every inch so extended, they shall have an increased width

The front and ends of said curbstones must be dressed straight and smooth for the breadth of one foot from the top; the top must also be dressed straight and smooth, and brought to an uniform thickness of six inches by dressing down the back for the breadth of three inches, and devilled to correspond with the rise of the pavement. The curbstones must be set so that the front shall lean back one and one half inches to the foot rise, and he top to correspond with the grade herein estab-

SECTION 6.—A gutter three feet wide shall be paved outside of sail curbstone, by placing a row of well hurnt brick on edge, with their ends to the curbstone, having fall from it of half an inch in their length; the remainder of the gutter to be paved with small smoothed or rounded stones, and supported by a small curbing or flat stone, set on edge and extending at least four inches lower than the adjoining pyvement of the gutter. The depth and shape of the said gutters shall, with the several uscents and descents of the same, he regulated by the Borough Surveyor, or other person appointed by the Council for that purpose. Section 7 .- That the several provisions, pow ers and penalties contained in the eighth, and tenth sections of an ordinance passed the 26th day of May, A.
