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AN ORDINANCE, FOR the regular cutting and paving Main Street, from Centre street to the upper culvert; Adams street, from Market to High street, and Third street, from Market to High street.

Section 1. Be it ordained, that the Board of Public Works, of the Borough of Pottsville, do hereby order and enact by the authority of the same, that the grades and regulations of the aforesaid streets be as follows:

Section 2. The curb stone on Centre street, from Centre street to the upper culvert, shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 3. The curb stone on Adams street, from Adams street to the upper culvert, shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 4. In that part of Market street, which is sixty feet wide, the curb stone shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 5. The curb stone on Adams street, from Adams street to the upper culvert, shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 6. The curb stone on Market street, which is sixty feet wide, the curb stone shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 7. The curb stone on Adams street, from Adams street to the upper culvert, shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 8. The curb stone on Market street, which is sixty feet wide, the curb stone shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.

Section 9. The curb stone on Adams street, from Adams street to the upper culvert, shall be placed eleven feet from the true line of the street, and that part which is one hundred and twenty feet wide, shall be placed fifteen feet from said line.
