We again find it necessary to publish a comparative statement of the coal Trade, for the purpose of warning the consumer shroad of the absolute necessity of coming forward and making his purchases, otherwise they may rest assured that there will be a short supply. As far as Philadelphia is concerned, the prices will not materially advance, in consequence of the ability of the Rail Road Company to supply that market during the winter season. But such will not be the case with distant markets, should all the avenues leading from Philadelphia be closed with ice during the winter season.

The low price of coal this year, and consequent introduction for various purposes for whichlit has not heretofore been used, and the decreased quantity from abroad (amounting to about 75 or 100,000 tons, caused by the Protective Tariff) and the increased demand for the Factories now in full operation, when all these are taken into consideration, the supply for the present year, in connection with the overstock, that will be required to keep the mark et regular, and preyent an increase of prices, will be about 1,300, t00 tons, or an increase over last year's shipment of about 200 000 tons. This statement, which can be relied on, shows that there is actually 81,552 tons less in the market than there was at this period last year. There remains but 13 weeks of the shipping season, including the whole month of November, to supply 643,000, (admitting that the Railroad can deliver 50,000 tons during the winter season) which will require a weekly shipment of about 50,000 per week, for the balance of the season. This quantity can be supplied, provided the consumers come forward in time to make their purchases, but if they, hold back any longer, an advance in the price of coal must take place during the winter season. there is actually 81,552 tons less in the

The overstock of coal for the last two years, and the reduction of toll on the canal and the transpor-tation on the Railroad in the midst of the shipping season, which caused a loss to those who purchased early, has, we learn from abroad, induced thousands to postpone their purchases, expecting a similar oc-currence to take place this year.
