Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the
Town Council, of the Borough of Pottsville, and
it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, that the grades and regulations
of the access and descents in Market street, from of the ascents and descents in Market street, from Centre street, to the upper culvert in Eighth street; Adams street, from Market to High street; and North Third street, from Market to High street; and the same is hereby fixed and established as follows :-

NORTH SIDE. ing at the Curb Stone recently set the North West corner of Centre and Market streets, which is one foot one inch above the top of Central Block, from thence rise four fect seven inches to the North East corner of Adams street, thence fall three inches and five-tenth to the north west corner of the same, from this point, rise four west corner inches, to a point geventy-five feet west of Third street, from thence to full one such and five tenths to the culvert across Market arcet. From thence rise six feet nine inches and eight tenths to Wolf's, at the northeast corner of Wol cott street, (which is four feet Higher than the present curb stone.) The curb at the northwest corner of Market square and Wolcott street, to be one foot lower than at the northeast corner, from thence to rise ten feet three inches and two-tenths to the middle of Levy's alley, thence to rise twelve feet five inches and six-tenths to the northeast corner of Courtland street and Market square, from thence to rise nine feet eight inches and sixtenths to the northeast corner of Seventh or John street, and from thence to rise nine feet nine inches to the middle of Eighth street, upper culvert.

The side-walks of Kot-ways en both sides of Centre street, from the south line of Morand on the west side of Railroad street between Market and Callowhill streets shall be graded, cut down, or nied up, according to the several ascents and descents perein about set forth, and curbed and payed and the guiters made and paved as herein after directed, and the property in front of which such footways or ridewalks and guiters shall be made and paved shall be and the same is hereby taxed with the expense thereof. in proportion to the extent of the same in front on said streets, agreeably to the provisions of the Act of Assembly entitled, "As employment to an act entitled an act incorporating the town of Pottsville in Schuylkill County into a Borough," passed the 15th day of June, A.D. 1840.

Section 5. The curb stones to be placed in said streets, shall be at least three-feet long, two fest wide, and six inches thick, and wherever it may be necessary to extend the curbitudes more than ten inches above the gutter, that for every inch so extended, they shall have any increased width

of two inches The front and ends of said curbstones must be dressed straight and smooth for the breadth of one foot from the top; the top must also be dressed straight and smooth, and brought to an uniform thickness of six inches by degesing down the back for the breadth of three inches, and devilled to correspond with the rise of the pavement. The curbsiones must be set so that the front shall lean back one and one half inches to the foot rise, and he top to correspond with the grade herein estab.

SECTION 6.—A gutter three feet wide shall be paved outside of said curbstone, by placing a row of well burnt brick on edge, with their ends to the curbstone, having fall from it of half an inch in their length, the remainder of the gutter to be paved with small smoothed or rounded stones, and supported by a small curbing or flat stone, set on edge and extending at least four inches lower than the adjoining pavement of the gutter. The depth and shape of the said guttere shall, with the several ascents and descents of the same, be regulated by the Borough Surveyor, or other person appointed by the Council for that purpose, Secretor 7.—That the several provisions, powers and penalties contained in the eighth, ninth and tenth sections of an ordinance passed the 26th day of May, A.
