AN ORDINANCE. For regulating, curbing and paving the side walks and gutters in parts of Centre and Rail

road Streets. Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Pottsville, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, that the grades or regulations of the ascents of Centre Street, from Contral Block north, wardly to the northeast corner of Laurel street, and southwardly to the south line of Morris's Add dittor, be, and the same is, hereby fixed and established as follows, viz:

NORTH CENTRE STREET, EAST SIDE At the northeast corner of Centre and Norwe vian streets the curb line shall commence twi nd a half inches below the top of Central Bl from thence fall one foot five inches to a culvert distant one hundred and two feet, from thency shall rise one foot seven and a half inches to the southeast corner of Market street thence level \$2 the northeast corner of said street, thence shall rise nine inches to a summit eighty feet distant thence fall one foct three inches to the southened corner of Callowhill street, thenco rise two inches to the northeast corner of said street, thence rise eight feet one inch and five tenths to the so east corner of High street, thence rise five inclies and five tooths to the northeast corner of raid street, and from thence rise twelve teet fire inches to the northeast corner of Laurel street NORTH CENTRE STREET, WEST SIDE.

Commencing at the Culvert one hundred and two feet north of Norwegian street, the line of the curb shall be three menes below the top of Central Block, and from thence shall rise the foot four inches to the southwest corner of Mignicel street, from thence level to the northwest corner of said street, thence full one foot three suches to the Culvert, ninety three feet distant, thence rise one foot two inches to the southwest corner of Callowhill street, thence level to the northwest corner of said street, thence rise one foot five inches in the distance of eighty feet, thence rise seven leet four inches to the west corner of High street, and from thence disc thirteen feet six inches to the southwest corner of Laurel street. SOUTH CENTRE STREET, EAST SIDE.

The curb line at the southen-t corner of Norwe-

ian street shall be eight inches above the top of Central Block, and from thence shall rise six seet to the northeast corner of Mahantango street, from thence rise four and a half inches to the southeast corner of said street, thence rise three feet ten inches and seven tenthe to the northing corner of Church Alley, thence level to the south-cast corner of said Alley, thence rise three feet nine inches to the northeast corner of Union street, thence rise nine feet five inches to the sout side of the next alley, thence fall sixteen get to the northeast corner of Mauch Chunk sixeet, thence rise fifteen feet seven inches to the gertheast corner of Market street in Morris's Addigion. thence level to the southeast corner of the said treet, and from thence fall twenty eight fest to the south line of Morris's Addition. south centre street, west side. Commencing at the Culvert one hundred and we feet north of Norwegian street, the curb line there, shall be three inches below the top of Central Block, and from thence shall rise seven for t leven inches to the northwest corner of Afghantongo street, from thence rise nine inches in the southwest side of the said street, thence juit four feet and two inches to the northwest correct of Church Alley, thence level to the southeast side of said alley, thence rise three feet reven siches to the northwest corner of Ur un street, thence rise nine feet five inches to the south side of the next alley, thence fall sixteen feet to a point opposite to the northeast corner of Mauch Chunk street, thence rise fourteen feet one inch to the northwest corner of Market street in Marris's Addition, thence level to the southwest corner of said streets, and from thence full twenty seven

feet three inches to the south line of Monito's Addition. WIDTH OF PAVEMENTS SICTION 2. The width of the pavements aide. walks in Centre street shall be as follows wiz .--In that part of Centre street between the south line of Morris's Addition and the South Jine of Benjamin Pott's Addition they shall be eleven feet wide. From thence to High street they shall e filteen feet wide on the east side of t and on the west side, of the same width as far north as Norwegian street, (neasuring in all cases from the true line of the street) and from thence shall extend in a straight line so as to be fourteen feet from the house at the south west cor-Laurel Alley, eleven feet from the west side of Centre street, and thence continue at the listance of eleven feet therefrom, to the southers corner

of Laurel street.
From the southeast corner of High street, the curb stone shall extend to a point thirden feet from the east side of Centre street, and distant one hundred and seven feet from Northern Block, from thence extend thirty-three feet tola joint e-leven feet from the cast side of the street, and from thence continue at the distance of eleven test from the east side of the street, to the south. east corner of Laurel street.

PART OF RAILROAD STREET, Secrios 3. Commencing at the northwest corfect seven inches below the top of Central Block, the curb line shall rise six inches to the sputiwest.

Corner of Callowhill street.

There shall be but one line of curpaione and one pavement or side-walk in this street, which shall be on the west side thereof, and say feet vide, measuring from the true line of the street. Section 4. The side walks or foot-wask on both sides of Centre-street, from the south line of Morris's Addition to the south side of Laurgh street, and on the west side of Ruitroad street between Market and Callowhill streets, shall be graded, cut down, or filled up, according to the several ascents and descents herein above set forth, and curbed and paved and the gutters made and paved as herein after directed, and the property in front of which such footways or sidescalks and gutters shall be made and paved, shall be and the same is hereby taxed with the expense thereof in proportion to the extent of the same in front on said streets, agreeably to the provisions of the Act of Assembly contitled, "A supplement to an act entitled an act incorporating the town of Pottsville in Schuylkill County into a Borough," passed the 15th day of June, A. D. 18th.

Secretary of the curb stones to be placed in said streets, shall be at least three feet long two feet wide, and six inches thick, and wherever it may be necessary to extend the curb stones inore than ten inches above the gutter, that for every inches extended they shall have an inches so extended, they shall have an increased width The front and ends of said curbstones must be dressed straight and smooth for the breadth of one foot from the top; the top must also be dressed

straight and smooth, and brought to an uniform thickness of six inches by dressing down the back for the breudth of three inches, and devilled to correspond with the rise of the payetnent. The curbstones must be set so that the from shall lean back one and one half inches to the leat rise, and the top to correspond with the grade hisroin catabalished. Secrion 6.—A gutter three feet wise shall be aved outside of said curbstone, by placing a row

of well burnt brick on edge, with their cads to the curbstone, having fall from it wight an inch in their length, the remainder of the gatter to be paved with small smoothed or roughed stones. and supported by a small curbing of flat stone, and supported by a small corbing of flat stone, set on edge and extending at least four inches lower than the adjoining pavement of the gutter. The depth and shape of the said gutters shall, with the several ascents and descents of the same, be regulated by the Borough Survey, or other person appointed by the Council for that purpose.

Section 7.—That the several provisions puwars and penalties contained in the exorth, nint. ers and penalties contained in the eighth, ninth and tenth sections of an ordinance passed the 26th day of May, A. D. 1843, entitled an ordinance for the regulation, curbing and paving of Market street from Centre street to the upper Colvert; Adams street from Market to High street, and Third street from Market to High street, be and the same are hereby made a part of the ordinance, the same as if the whole of the said sections were herein set forth in fall.
