And it it shall be shown to the court where the trial of such offence shall be liad, that the person so offending was not a resident of the

city, ward, district, or township where the said offence was committed, and not entitled to vote therein, then, on conviction, he shall be souteneed to pay a fine of not less than one hundred nor thore than one thousand dollars, and be imprished not ess than six months nor more than two years.
