By the last report of the general superintendent, of December 31, 1842, there were on the road, at that date, 1130 coal care and 16 coul engines; these numbers have been increased to 1592 coal cars, during the months of hear and June of this year, and to 30 loco not e engines, adapted to hauling roal, between the months of

June and September 1849. Statement A. will sliew in detail, the force of nachinery at present of the road. The quantity of coal hauled over the road to

June 30, before the mechine y had been increased to its present force and the track and weaves made more effective. amounted to 62,099 tons; since which time to the moven date, a period of five months, the coal tonnage has isen to 156,-612 tons, making a total of 210,711 tons of coal transported to market during the eleven calender nonths ending November 20, 1349.

The efficiency of the road in passing, with e pedition and safety, coal, freight, and passenge rains, moving in opposite directions, has been ve. ry materially increased by the completion, in July last, of 10 miles of double track, enteneing from Baumstown to one mile above Reeding.

Statement C. exhibits in detail the empenses of the transportation department of the 10ad, und statement D. the apportionment of these expenses to the several items of business on the road-coal freight and passengers.

It will be observed from the latter statement, that the actual cost of hauling coal from the mines to the Delaware, including the returning empty cars, has been, during the year, but 46 cents per ton This has been much higher than-may be calculated on for the future, for the following reasons:

1st. The inferior quality of construction of most of the coal cars built for the Company, cwing, in a great measure, to the haste with which they were constructed, causing an unnecessary frequency of accident from breaking anles, &c. and a serious increase in their repairs.

2nd. The comparatively small and uncertain business done in the early part of the year, which consequently increased the cost of carriage per ton, from engines failing to obtain trains from either end of the line, and running, in some cases with loads below their allotted complements.

3d. From the expense, direct and indirect, attending the employment of 12 new engines, built by the Locks and Canals Co., each of these being placed in the heavy business of the road, immediately on being put together, and, on several occasions, failing when on duty, from defective arangements, and quality of some of the lighter gearing.

4th. From the short period, (the last three nonths only;) during which there has been employed a new system of working the road, by which the maximum effect of all its machinery and track facilities was obtained, with an evident conomy resulting.

6th. The greater proportion of light six wheel ed engines, in the first six months of the year ompared with the whole number in the latter part; the former hauling lighter trains, and consequently increasing the cost per tor of cost.

Lastly. The gross expenses of the transportation department of the road are exhibited in detail in statement C. It is proper to state, that some portion of these expenses were necessarily larger on the commencement of a business of such magnitude, without the required facilities for carrying it on, such as tu n-outs, track room, machinery and vorkshops, and supply of water to water stations. A very considerable portion also of these expenses may be considered permanent, and are but slightly increased by a business double or trolle that hitherto done on the road. Among these latter expenses may be enumerated the repairs of roadway, salaries of officers and agents, stationary and printing, hauling across Schuylkill bridge, wages of watchmen, coal for all offices and stations, wages of depot hands, in part, materials for depots,
