The Constitutionality of Mr. M'Duffic's revenue bill has been under discussion, for some day's past in the Senate. It was referred to the Committee on Finance, who have reported it back to the Senate as not within the Constitutional prerogative of that body to originate a revenue measure. I had anticipated such a result, as a reference to my letter, at the time of its report, will show.
