The Governor of Illinois, it is said, has granted an order to try Joe Smith, the Mormon prophet for unofficer-like conduct. A mandamus has also been issued by Judge Pope, of Illinois, against the Nauvoo council, for ordering the office of the Expositor to be demolished, and thus exceeding the authority granted by the charter of the city. The people in the neighborhood of Nauvoo, were organizing into military companies at the latest dates, and arming themselves for a serious conflict. At Warsaw business had been almost entirely suspended, and every able-bodied man, was under arms, and almost constantly in drill.

What becomes of the Pins?-The Pin Factory of Messrs. Slocum, Jilson & Co., at Poughkeepsie, manufacture 1,300 lbs of pins per day, of various sizes, and they are getting additional machinery ready, by which they can soon manufacture 2,500 lbs. daily. They employ in the various branches of their operation 100 hands regularly. They use 380 tons of wire, and between 2,000 and 3,000 reams of paper per annum. Their pins sell upon the average, at 25 cents per poundmaking the annual value of their sales, when their additional works are in full operation, at least \$250,000. In view of these facts, the question may be again started, "what becomes of all the pins?"

Counterfeit Gold Coin.-The coiner at the mint at Dahlonega cautions the public against counterfeit quarter eagles which are in circulation. They purport to have been struck at the mint in that place in 1543.

Each quarter cagle issued at the mint contains sixty-four and a half grains; on cutting the edge with a knife and applying acid, they were shown to be composed of brass, (composition of zine and copper,) and gilt either by the electro-galvanic process, or by the ordinary modes of gilding, as the acid would not affect any part but where the surface was removed. The appearance as to color was tolerably good.

Immigrants.-We learn from an official source that 212 vessels arrived at this port during the month of June, just closed, being 47 more than during the same month last year. The above 212 brought 12,896 passengers, being an increase of 7654 upon the number arrived in June, 1843.

During the last quarter, ending 30th June, the number of passengers arrived was 25,098 being a large increase upon last year. At Quebec, on the contrary, down to June 22d only 8827 passengers had arrived this season, being 1171 less than last year to same date. N. Y. Jour. Com.


