THE DEMAND for Coal is still on the increase, and the price begins to look upward.

The market will require at least 1,500,000 tons of Coal this season to supply the consumption. After riving the Lackawana region 230,000 tons and all the other regions, except the Schuylkill and Lehigh 90,000 tons, which is all they can possibly ship to market, during the whole season, it will require a weekly, for the balance of the season, of 35,000 tons from the Schuylkill and Lehigh shipments to supply the market. The weekly shipments from the last named two regions, now amount to about 33,000.

The following is a comparative statement of the shipments to same period last year, conquencing from the first of April of each year, the commencement of the Coal year.
