THE COAL TRADE.

We learn that boats on the Canal have been very scarce for the last week, and freight has adranced five cents per ton, although not more than 12,000 tons takes that Channel per week. The cars on the Rail Road, also are fully employed. This state of affairs presents a subject for reflection—it exhibits in bold relief the destruction which follows a mal-administration of Government, and the immense sacrifices the people have to undergo, when the business of the country is prostrated. Six years ago, before the country was ursed with the blighting effects of Van Buren Locofocoism, there were a sufficient number of Boats on the line of Canal, to carry to market

27,000 tons of coal weekly, and the trade flourished. The destructive measures were consummated -- general prostration followed -- the coal trade dif not escape—prices of coal and freight, were redu-ced to ruinous rates—no more boats were built others were suffered to rot-and now, with two avenues to market, Canal and Rail Road, the fo cilities of both, are not sufficient at present to carry twenty-three thousand tons of Coal to mar-ket weekly, four thousand tons less than was accommodated on the Canal alone, six years ago. The depreciation on Boat property alone has exceeded two hundred thousand dollars.

Oh! have not the people paid dearly for support-ing destructive Locofocoism.
