

DIFFERENT MANURES. The dung of horses, sheep, and of cattle generally act as fertilizers only in proportion as they are combined with certain soils. On sandy, calareous soils, they are very profitable—such soils being deprived of the silicate of potash, and of the phosphate; while on a dry soil, rich in polash, or on a soil formed of the ruins of granite, of porphyry, of clingstone, these manures are of little value.

About that time, expecting from the appearance of the weather it weuld rain, he sowed upon it the usual quantity of Guang but the weather clearing up no rain fell upon it for two weeks after; and in two weeks after that, the unmanured portion in the fall had not only caught up to the other, but it out-stripped it; and at this time the difference in favor of that to which Guano was applied; is very distinct to the eye, though this substance has had but a few weeks in which to operate.
