Lime its Effects as a Manure. Of the use and advantage of the compost form. As there are many cases in which lime ought be applied unmixed and in the caustic state. so there are others in which it is best and most eneficially laid upon the land in a mild state and

in the form of compost. 1. When lime is required only in small quantiies, it can be more evenly spread when previously well mixed with from 3 to 8 times its bulk of

2. On light sandy and gravelly soils, when of a dry character, unmixed lime will bring up much cow-wheat (melanpyrum) and red poppy. If they are moist soils, or if rainy weather ensue the lime is apt to run into mortar, and thus toform either an impervious subsoil, or jumps of hard conglomerate which are brought up by the plough, but do not really yield their lime to the soil .-These bad consequences are all avoided by ad-

ding the lime in form of con post;
3. Applied to grass lands—unless the soil be stiff clay-or much coarse grass is to be extrepated t is generally better and safer to apply is in compost form. The action of the lime on tender heronge is by this means moderated, and its exnausting effect lessened upon soils which con-

tain little vegetable matter. 4. In the compost form the same quantity of ime acts more immediately. While lying in a state of mixture those chemical changes which lime other induces or promotes, have already to a certain extent taken place, and thus the sensible effect of the lime becomes apparent in a sborter time after it has been laid upon the land.

5. This is still more distinctly, the case, when esides earthly matter, decayed vegetable substanees, ditch scourings, and other refuse are mixed with the lime. The experience of every practical man has long proved how very much more enriching such composts are, and more obvious in their effect upon the soil, than the simple application of lime alone.

6. It is stated as the result of extended trial in Flanders and in parts of France, that a much smaller quantity of lime laid on in this form will produce an equal effect. For, this one cause may be that the rains are prevented from acting upon the mass of compast as they would do upon the open soil-ip washing out cittle; the lime itself or the saline substances which are produced during its contact with the earthly and regetable matter with which it is mixed.

its action. This fact is of the same kind with that generally admitted in respect to marls and unmixed lime-that it is more sensible in the second ear, or in the second rotation, than in the first. In conclusion, it may be stated that this form of application is especially adapted 30 the lightest and driest soils, and to such as are provest in vegetable matter. LEARNING STEERS TO BACK.

7. The older the compost the more fertilizing is

several years ago with the signature of "A Team-"I have observed that very little attention is paid by our farmers to learn their steers to back; but athey become able to draw a load forward, they are often unmercifully beaten on the head and face. because they will not back as large a load, the drivers forgetting that much pains have been taken to learn them to draw well forward, but none to push backward. To remedy the occasion of this beating and trouble, as soon as I have learned my steers to be handy, as it is called, and to draw forward, I place them on a cart where the land is descending in a small degree. In the situation they will soon learn with ease to back it; then I place them on level land, and exercise them there; then, I learn them to back up land a little rising; the cart having ho load in it thus far. When I have learned them to stand up to the tongue as they ought, and back an empty cart, I next either put a small weight in the cart, or take them where the land rises faster, which answers the same purpose. Thus in a few days they can be learned to back well, and know how to do it, which by a little uso afterwards they will never forget. This may appear of little consequence to some, but when it is emembered how frequently we want to back a load, and how convenient it often is to have cattle that back well, why should we not learn them for the time when we want them thus to act. Besides, it saves the blows and the vexation. I never consider a pair of oxen well hroke until they will back with ease any reasonable load, and I would give a very considerable sum more for a

yoke of oven thus tutored, than for those that were not." Learning Oxen to Pull Together .- Oxen sometimes contract a bad habit of pulling or hauling against each other; and sometimes crowd each other so as to render them almost entirely useless as laborers. It is said that by turning them out to feed in the yoke, they will learn to move in conert, and thus be broken of the favits of pulling

and crossing.
If a yoke of oxen were fastened to a heavy loaind crowding. led sledge or drag, placed in a pasture, and the oxen secured in such a manner that they could not cast or injure themselves, and the load were so neavy that they must act in concert to move, it, hey would soon learn to pull together, and betrue o the voke. Having eaten the grass within reach of their first location, they would of necessity unite their efforts to remove their load to a fresh spot, and would adopt for their matto-United, we feed; divided. we starve. - Complète Farmer.

WASH FOR TREES .- The best wash for the bolies of young trees is ley made but of ashes or potish: one pound of poinsh will be enough for one gallon of water. This should be applied with a brush or swab to the body of the free in the month of July, for this is the season in which insects lay their eggs on the body and the roots of the tree. This wash will entirely destroy the moss on the hody-all the lice and eggs and young worms that come in contact with it. The wash is much preferred to lime wash, and it is a vegetable subtance, and it will not close the pores of the wood as lime will. It has been long tried by the best orchardists, and has never been known to injure the apple tree, when applied as above directed.

Binns. Instruct your boys to protect and treat the birds kinely. One robin will do more to destroy the bugs, worms, &c., that infest your crops than a dozen men. Protect them as valuable friends.

PRESERVING EGGS.-To preserve eggs put & layer of salt in the bottom of a jar, and stick the eggs into the salt, point downwords, till a layer of eggs is made, when more salt is put in, and again a layer of eggs, and so on successively till the jar is full,
